

Curling shapes up in Totem draw

Defending Totem Conference Womens champions Capilano College from North Vancouver slid by two opponents and squeezed by the third in the opening rounds of the B.C. college curling championships at the Kamloops Curling Club Friday.

Other teams that remained undefeated after the opening three rounds of the round robin were Okanagan College Womens rink from Kelowna, BCIT's mens rink from Burnaby and College of New Caledonia's mixed rink from Prince George.

Cariboo College's three rinks suffered some trouncings as well as a couple close losses on the first day.

CC womens rink lost out to a strong CNC rink in the three round 11-10 in an extra end. They also lost 9-2 to Okanagan and 12-4 to Capilano.

Cariboo's Men didn't do very well either, as they went down to defeat 10-4 at the hands of CNC and 9-0 in four ends to Okanagan.

One of the tightest matches of the day was between Capilano, skiped by Robin Chamberlain, and CNC skipped by Diane Lanski. Capilano took a commanding lead of 8-3 in the fourth end, but CNC fought back and managed to take a 10-9 lead in the eighth end.

Chamberlain itied it up in the ninth, but ran into problems in

the tenth with both her second and thirds missing their shots. After Chamberlain made some excellent shots it came down to the wire for Capilano as all Lanski had to do was draw into the house more than six inches. She didn't and Capilano won 11-10.

Other womens scores in the opening rounds were: Malispina College from Nanaimo losing to CNC 10-8, Malispina over BCIT 15-4, Okanagan beat Malispina 9-7 and Capilano took BCIT 8-3.

Mens curling results were: CNC edged Okanagan 10-5; BCIT trounded Cariboo 13-6 and BCIT slipped by CNC 6-4.

Mixed results: Okanagan bombed BCIT 9-5, Okanagan beat CNC 11-5, CNC got past Malispina 15-4, Okanagan nudged Malispina 8-7 and CNC snuck past Cariboo 7-6.

Blues go to finals

Last weekend at the Totem conference Curling Championships in Kamloops the Capilano College Blues were victorious giving the College its third straight win.

Skip Robyn Chamberlain, third Denise Denham, second Judy Bertola, lead Jackie Plourde and alternate Susan Prachnan squeaked by Kelowna's Okanagan College with a 7-6 win in sudden death playoff.

The Okanagan and Capilano squads had finished in a dead lock for first place in the round robin tourney with identical records of four wins and one loss. The Blues gave up their only loss to the

Okanagan team with a 10-4 tally.

The team from Kelowna put on a last ditch effort to win the deciding match after the Cap College girls had built up a 7-0 lead in the first five ends. However the locals held them off for the victory.

The Blues now head to The Pas, Manitoba to represent the province in the 4-West College Championships March 2-4.

The Western Canadian title was lost to Alberta in the final round last year while two years ago Cap College representatives went undefeated all the way to take the title.

Curlers Three Time Winners

Capilano College Blues Women's Curling team won their third straight Totem conference championship in Kamloops this weekend, squeaking by Okanagan College from Kelowna 7 to 6 in a sudden death play-off game. Teams from the College of New Caledonia in Prince George, Malaspina College from Nanaimo, Cariboo College in Kamloops and BCTT from Burnaby rounded out the single round robin women's event. Okanagan and

Capilano finished the round robin tournament dead locked for first place with identical 4 to 1 records. Earlier in the tournament, Okanagan had handed Capilano its only loss—a 10 to 4 drubbing—before folding in the sudden death final. In the deciding game, Cap College stole in the first five ends on their way to a 7 to 0 lead, then held off a late surge by Okanagan College to record their win. The Blues will now represent B.C. in

the 4-West College Championships to be held at The Pas, Manitoba, March 2nd to 4th. Last year at 4-West, The Blues lost in the final to Alberta, while two years ago, they were undefeated in winning the Western Canadian title. Blue team members are Skip Robyn Chamberlain, 3rd Denise Denham, 2nd Judy Bertola, Lead Jackie Plourde and alternate Susan Prachnan. The rink is coached by Sue Benton.

B.C. athletes win 4-West student titles

BRANDON — Mount Royal College of Calgary and Vancouver Community College captured the division titles Saturday in the 4-West basketball championships.

Mount Royal defeated Vancouver 54-53 to take the women's title while Vancouver bounced Briarcrest Bible College of Regina 72-60 to win the men's championship.

The 4-West competitions are played between provincial champions from non-degree granting institutions in Western Canada.

● Also at Brandon, B.C. teams accumulated a total of 21 points Friday and Saturday to take the overall 4-West badminton championship.

Alberta was second with 16 points while Saskatchewan trailed with 12. Manitoba had just six points.

Calvin Holoboff of Vancouver Community College won the men's singles, followed by Darryl Wood of Northern Alberta Institute of Technology in Edmonton and Russell Unilowsky of the Kelsey Institute in Saskatoon.

The women's singles went to Janice Wood of Southern Alberta Institute of Technology in Calgary. Second was Janice Robbins of Wascana Institute in Regina and third was Susan Funk of Assiniboine Community College in Brandon.

Men's doubles winners were Brad Pate and Charn Grewall of Douglas College, Vancouver, while Beryl Palmer and Jean Botkin of Douglas College won the women's doubles and Peter Armitage and Maureen Chan of VCC the mixed doubles.

● At The Pas, teams from B.C., Alberta and Saskatchewan walked off with the laurels Saturday in the 4-west curling championships.

Capilano College of North Vancouver defeated Red River Community of Winnipeg 10-1 to win the women's title while in the men's event, Northern Alberta Tech. defeated Red River 9-3 with the consolation trophy going to College of New Caledonia, Prince George, which defeated Saskatchewan Tech. 8-2.

Saskatchewan Tech. edged Keewatin Community College of The Pas 7-6 to win the mixed championship, and the consolation event
