

# Capilano College celebrates tenth anniversary

This fall, Capilano College begins its tenth year of operation as a community college.

In order to celebrate this milestone, it is their intention to make this year a special one and they invite all members of the community to join in events throughout the year.

Ten years ago, many North Shore and Howe Sound residents put a great deal of time and energy into the preparatory work necessary to establish a brand new college and everyone who has studied at Capilano owes them gratitude and recognition.

Over the years, the college

board has been able to assemble a fine group of teachers, support staff members and able administrators.

Virtually every year they have grown out of the facilities available to the college and have tried to extend their services to as many people as possible within the community.

Year by year, they have received far greater support and understanding from the School

Districts and from the Ministry of Education.

Of course, ten years is a very short time in the life of an institution, and the college feels that they have only begun their mission.

They hope their special events during 1978-79 will serve to demonstrate how a community college differs from other kinds of institutions and its potential for educational service.

They do not, however, wish to look back, as much as ahead, to the next ten years and beyond, and to assure the community that the college will continue to develop as a first-class post-secondary educational facility, offering a broad range of quality programs for a very diverse student population.

Dr. L. Ssivastava, chairman of the Capilano College Council, said "We will continue to strive for excellence in everything we do, so that all Capilano students will reach out for their own levels of scholastic excellence."

This fall, in Squamish, the college is offering Creative Writing, B.C. Geography and Geology, Weaving and General Drawing.

**Creative Writing** will be an intensive workshop course designed to help students develop their skill in self-expression and craftsmanship in

poetry, fiction and drama, Thursday evenings at the portable behind the high school from 7 to 10 p.m.

Students will be encouraged to develop their work to the point at which it should be acceptable for publication in the Capilano Review and other literary magazines.

**British Columbia; a Regional Analysis** will examine the criteria for designating regions; the historical development of settlement in the Western Cordillera; resource extraction and other current activity; environmental perception and man-land relationships in the B.C. landscape. The course will take place Tuesdays from 7 to 10 p.m. at the high school.

**Physical Geology** will include study of structure and identification of common minerals; economic mineral deposits; origin and classification of rocks; weathering and erosion; development of landforms; volcanoes and earthquakes and the internal constitution of the earth and origin of the earth.

The course takes place Mondays and Wednesdays from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. at the high school.

Fees for the above are \$21 with the addition of a \$5 lab fee for the Geology course. To register call your local Cap College office at 892-5322.
