GREAT PROGRESS ON INTER-RIVER FACILITIES FOR THIS YEAR

The big news this last week, as circulated in a February 15 special issue of this publication, was the approval of emergency borrowing by two of our constituent school boards. Coming on top of the appointment of the architects the week prior, this makes us a lot closer to a reality of new facilities at Inter-River this year.

Things are now beginning to move very quickly. The Research and Development Committee is in high gear on the concept and the details of spaces for the Inter-River facility. This week they will be meeting again on Tuesday, and on Wednesday they are to make a presentation to faculty (1:00 p.m. St. Davids) on this facility. The architects will be at these meetings. It is hoped that the architects can be into site and facility design within the next two weeks.

SUMMER SEMESTER - MAY 15 - JUNE 29

The "powers that be" (and the pertinent committees) have apparently decided that there will definitely be a summer semester again this year. As in the past there will be a limited course offering (10-12 are planned at present) and students will only be able to take a maximum of two courses. There will also again be arrangements made with Vancouver City College for any students who desire or need a full course semester, perhaps in order to be ready to transfer into one of the universities in September. The place this year is our Welch Street Centre and most courses will be given after 4:00 p.m. each day.

B. C. COLLEGE FACULTIES FEDERATION MEETS HERE

Over the weekend the executives of the faculty association of eight of the Colleges met at the College. In case any of you don't already know it Sonja Sanguenetti is presently the President of this B.C. Federation.
