Mayor Jim Elliott told the scholarship winners not to believe reporters and politicians when they say how bad things are. "Ideas are what is needed," he said, "We have the finances, we are looking to you for ideas. Don't let us down."

Out of this year's graduating class, thirty-two students are attending university, eleven are at Capilano College and three each at BCIT and at vocational school.

## Training for unemployed apprentices to begin in Oct.

A joint federal-provincial program to return laid-off apprentices to on-the-job training will begin in B.C. in October.

Participants will receive a \$25 weekly training incentive payment

in addition to unemployment insurance benefits. They will receive training in simulated on-the-job conditions established cooperatively by community colleges, various unions and

employers.

The initiative resulted from the B.C. provincial apprenticeship board's concern that, with apprentices being laid off, trades' training in B.C. would decline during the current economic recession.

This would mean shortages of critical trade skills and likely missed opportunities for development when the economy turns upward.

Community colleges throughout the province have indicated an interest in the program. It has also enlisted encouragement and support from various unions involved and from many employers who are willing to provide equipment on which apprentices will work.
