#### FOR THOSE INTERESTED IN PRE-SCHOOL CHILDREN

**Education 152** — Curriculum planning, Mondays and Wednesdays, 7-8:30 p.m.; **Psychology 150**, child psychology, Mondays and Wednesdays 8:30-10 p.m.; **Health 150**, nutrition, diseases, etc. of pre-school child, Tuesdays and Thursdays 7 - 8:30 p.m.

#### FOR THOSE WHO ARE INTERESTED IN MUSIC

Music 150, choral explorations; Music 120, music history; Music 100, music theory; Music 110, music appreciation; Music 160, methods of teaching instruments; Music 170, vocal repertoire; Music 172, piano repertoire; Music 174, instrumental ensemble; Music 180, piano class.

### FOR THOSE WHO ARE INTERESTED IN LANGUAGES

Japanese 100, an intensive beginning course in basic Japanese; Japanese 101, first-year Japanese; French 102, an introduction to French using the audio-visual approach. Spanish and German are also available.

## FOR THOSE INTERESTED IN "EXPANDING THEIR MINDS"

#### Think about these-

English 204, Major American writers to 1850; English 104, a study of twentieth century short stories and novels; Fine Arts 100, a history of art to 1400; Fine Arts 101, history of art, 1400-1750; History 201, Man and his city since 1850; Philosophy 101, introduction to philosophy; Economics 100, an introduction to economics; Biology 104, current concepts in biology; Geology 110, physical geology; General Studies 150, contemporary issues, science, a general overview of all phases of science; Psychology 100, introduction to psychology; Psychology 200, social psychology.

With a few exceptions, these courses do not require any educational prerequisites. All carry college credits and some carry university credits.
