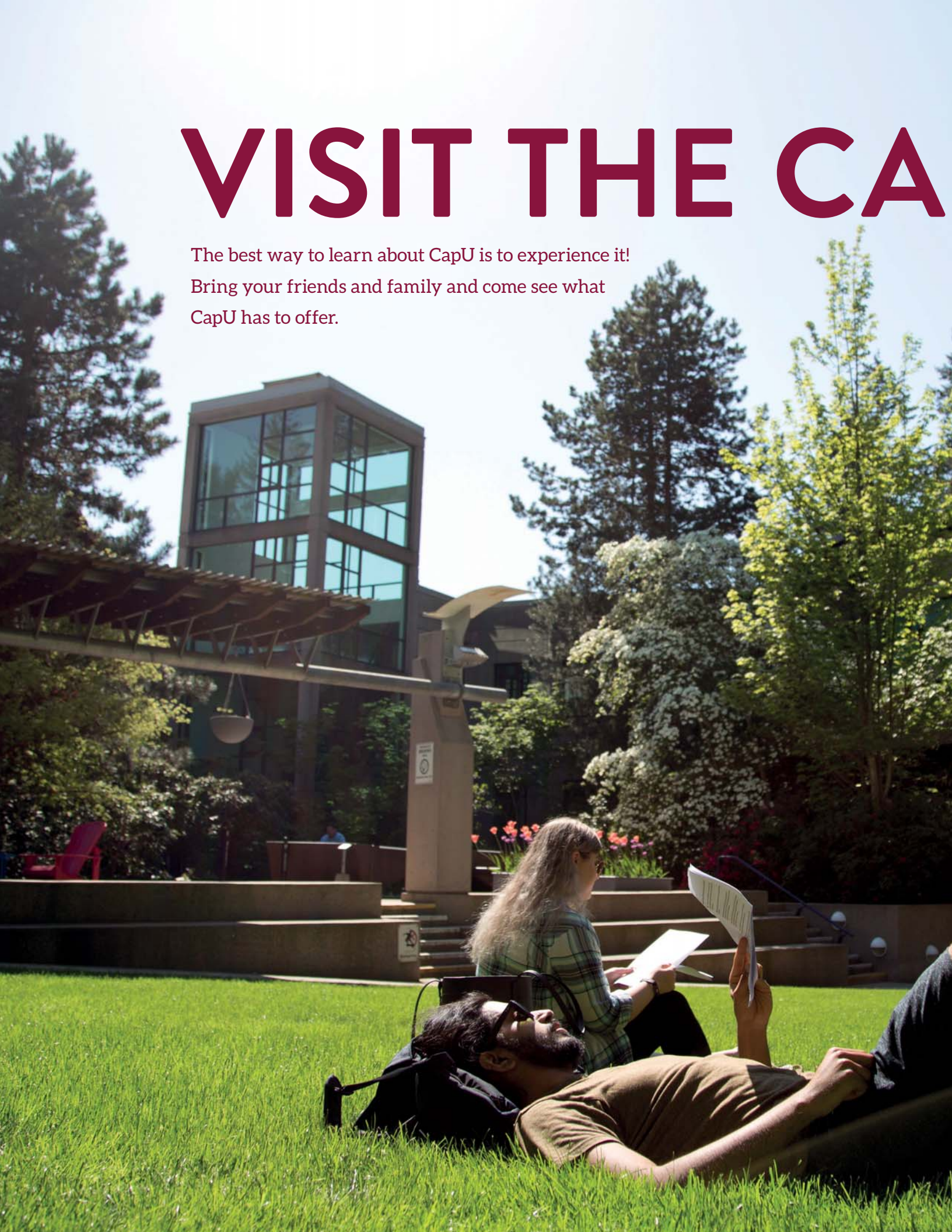

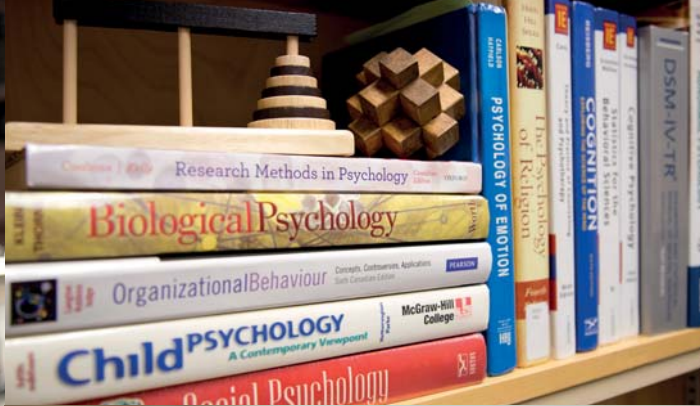
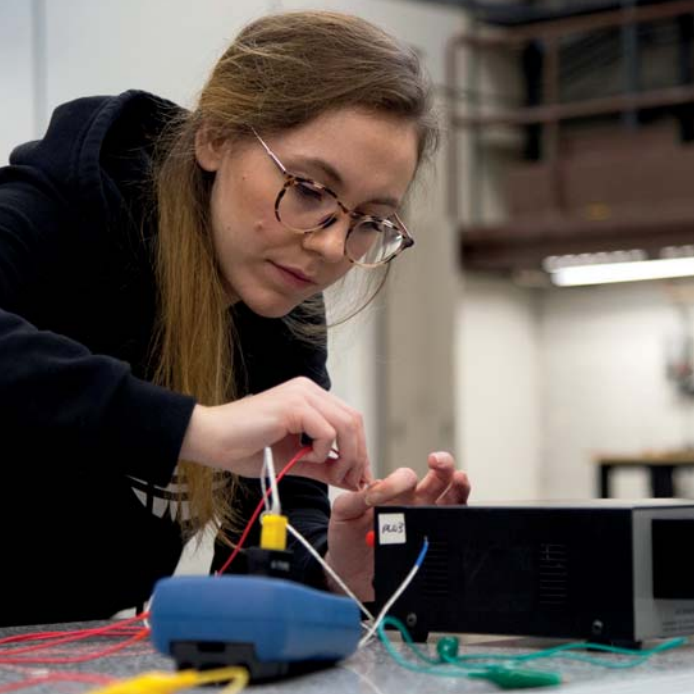

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS: STUDY PERMITS

Students studying in Canada for more than six months are required to have a Study Permit from Immigration Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). Full-time academic status is required by IRCC, which is equivalent to nine academic credits at Capilano University. A Co-op Work Permit is required for all programs where a practicum is a graduation requirement. Visit: cic.gc.ca/english/study

Exchange or Visiting International Students

Students do not need a Study Permit if they plan to take a course or program in Canada that lasts six months or less. Citizens from certain countries will be required to have a Temporary Resident Visa.

Online Programs

International students may apply for admission to online programs to study from their home countries. International students enrolled in online programs will not be eligible for a Study Permit.

If you do not qualify with one of the above, submit a request for a Waiver of the English Language Requirement to Admissions in the Registrar's Office.

If you plan to enrol in a first-year English course, you must submit the results of the Language Proficiency Index (LPI) test or take the Capilano English Diagnostic Test (EDT) prior to registration, unless you have achieved the following:

- a final grade of 73% or higher in English 12, English 12 First Peoples, or English Literature 12
- an LPI score of 24 or higher
- a final grade of 4 or higher in an Advanced Placement course in English Composition or English Literature
- a final grade of 4 or higher in the International Baccalaureate Language A: Literature, Language A: Language and Literature, or Language A: Literature and Performance—Higher Level and Standard Level
- a final grade of B+ or higher in BENG 052 or BENG 053 and BENG 054
- a final grade of C- or higher in an English transfer course from another university or college
- a degree from an English-speaking university
- a C grade or higher in FAL X99 from Simon Fraser University
- IELTS (academic): score of 6.5 or higher with a minimum band of level 6.0
- TOEFL (IBT): score of 88 or higher with no section below 20

Please note: Successful completion of any EAP course does not qualify you for direct entry into English 010 or English 100; however, you may qualify for a bridge that combines EAP 100, EAP 101 and ENGL 100.

If you are a current B.C. high school student, you may self-report your grades between January 15 and March 31 for the fall semester.

International Students: Upon receiving a Letter of Offer, international students must pay a tuition deposit. As soon as the Centre for International Experience (CIE) receives this deposit, a Letter of Acceptance will be issued, which can be used to renew or apply for a Study Permit (and an entry visa, depending on citizenship).

3 Register for classes and pay your tuition

You will receive information about registration through your CapU email account including the date and time that you can start registering—this is your “Registration Time Ticket.” Register as soon as possible after that time for the best course selection. If you need help selecting courses, contact academic advising at 604 984 4900 or advising@capilanou.ca

To confirm your registration, pay the balance of your tuition before the fee payment deadline. See capilanou.ca/fees. Some payments take time to process. Please make payments up to 10 days before the fee deadline to confirm your registration. Always quote your Capilano University student number with any payment.
