Michael Brecker Band

The man is revered by his peers and idolized by music students who painstakingly pour over transcriptions of his incandescent solos. And they've got plenty of material to draw from. His prodigious output over the past two decades is astounding. As his bio puts it:

"His appearance on nearly 400 albums (Freddie Hubbard and Kenny Wheeler to Dire Straits and Bruce Springsteen) constitutes a virtual pantheon of popular sound."

Michael Brecker's distinctive, emotionally charged tenor sax first made its presence felt worldwide in the context of **Dreams**, an adventurous fusion outfit he formed in 1970 with older brother Randy on trumpet, Billy Cobham on drums, Will Lee on bass and John Abercrombie on guitar. They recorded two albums (that still hold up today) for Columbia before disbanding in 1973.

From 1975 to '80, Michael and Randy teamed up as the **Brecker Brothers**, releasing six slick and very popular albums on Arista. **Steps Ahead** was born in 1979 with Michael Mainieri, Don Grolnick, Steve Gadd and Eddie Gomez.

The recently formed **Michael Brecker Band** is the saxophonist's latest project. This group features

Mike Stern on guitar and has been praised by critics and fans around the world. During the 1987 du Maurier International Jazz Festival Vancouver the band gave a sensational performance.

Lunar Adventures

Formed in 1985, the Vancouver quartet Lunar Adventures includes Coat Cooke, tenor and alto saxophones; Ron Samworth, electric guitar; Clyde Reed, "Oregon Bass"; Gregg Simpson, drums, percussion, sound collages. The group takes its name from a composition by Coat Cooke, who together with Simpson compose all of the material for the group.

The music of **Lunar Adventures** reflects a variety of sources and influences from Jazz and Harmolodic Funk, to Celtic and other World Music traditions. Their solo and collective improvisations are rooted in both free jazz and the blues. Writing in Earshot Magazine in Seattle, Paul de Barros calls Lunar Adventures "one of the most accessible, and well-thought out units working the area."

Since forming in 1985, Lunar
Adventures has played the du
Maurier International Jazz Festival
three times, opened for Ornette
Coleman's Prime Time in 1988 and
played the Edmonton Jazz Festival.



Chief Feature

Chief Feature's music is a marriage of traditional and avantgarde elements; slightly off-centre tunes that you can't stop humming. Original compositions inspired by Ornette Coleman and Albert Ayler played by an exciting auartet of Vancouver's best.

Recent appearances for Chief
Feature include Vancouver's du
Maurier International Jazz
Festival, the Ottawa Jazz Festival
and the Seattle, New Jazz New
City concert series.

Bruce Freedman-tenor saxophone Clyde Reed-bass Bill Clark-trumpet Stan Taylor-drums Jazz vocalist Kete Hammett-Vaughan is well known in Vancouver for her performances of mainstream jazz and standards.

In recent times Kate has been exploring extended vocal techniques in free improvisation and original contemporary jazz. Kate's 1988 concert appearances with her group Turneround include New Orchestra Workshop's Hear It N.O.W. series of concerts, the dimensional Jazz Festival Vancouver and the West Coast Semi-Finals of the Alcan National Jazz Competition.

This powerful ensemble of young Montreal musicians led by pianist Beaudet is recognized as one of the most dynamic bands in Canada.

They perform mostly original compositions reminiscent of McCoy Tyner and Cecil Taylor. Rhythmic strength abounds with the team of drummer Michel Raite, bassist Normand Guilbeault and Coltraneinspired saxophonist Yannick Rieu.

Their performance at the 1987 du Maurier International Jazz Festival revealed a very tight band capable of great dynamic range and spirited improvisation.

Such solos come in an industrial strength only; others are tempered by his avowed French impressionist influence that finds him something of a romantic. Paul Plimley

Pianist/vibraphonist Paul Plimley is among the most creative musicians working in Canada today.

A graduate of the Royal
Conservatory of Toronto, he
studied piano at the University of
British Columbia and with Cecil
Taylor. In 1976 he formed the
Vancouver Sound Ensemble with
drummer Gregg Simpson. He next
joined the New Orchestra Qunitet
and recorded an album with that
aroup in 1979.

Plimley toured across Canada in 1979, 1980 and 1986 while leading an octet that performed at both the Edmonton and du Maurier International Jazz Festivals. He is an exciting pianist and accomplished composer who is equally at home with popular songs, jazz standards, and original works and has performed in a wide variety of musical settings over the years.

Tom Cora & Hans Reichel

These two international artists combine rhythmic flexibility with technical virtuosity to create a maximum amount of music from a minumum number of people.

Cora brings a four-limbed approach to the cello, employing various electronic devices triggered by foot pedals. He has toured the world extensively as a solo artist, in duet with Eugene Chadbourne, Fred Frith (as Skeleton Crew), as a member of Curlew and gave stunning performances during the 1988 du Maurier International Jazz Festival.

Hens Reichel has been playing in international improvising circles since 1970. Whether it's Manila or Zagreb, Paris or Tokyo, the unassuming guitarist from Wuppertal is an enthralling performer.

His instruments themselves exert a special fascination. Reichel is never satisfied, and constantly reinvents his guitars, acoustic and electric, to ever more demanding specifications. As a master craftsman he has produced some astonishing variations, but they are built with specific goals in minds, mostly to accommodate a highly original right-hand technique which enables the creation of a quite different timbral range.

In a way, the logical place for Hans Reichel's music would be in the New Age Department; but this is no vacuous background music, no sanitized droning. This is New Age with guts, lyrical but engaged, hypnotic but laced with wry humour, spontaneous and full of heart.

UNITY

(u nite) n state of oneness: combination of separate parts into connected whole, or of different people with common aim.

UNITY was founded in October 1987 as a vehicle of expression for each member as composer and improvisor. The magic that resulted from this combination of musicians is in no way ordinary. The music has turned out to be much greater than the components.

Each performance is unique, an expression of the musicians' lives at that particular time. The solos can be tentative and searching or brazen and demanding. The instruments sometimes challenge their traditional roles taking the music to new and different heights; a heartfelt experience that transcends intellect.

UNITY has been enthusiastically received at every concert by audiences and **cr**itics alike.

N.O.W. Orchestra

The New Orchestra Workshop was formed in 1977 by a group of Vancouver musicians to fulfill a need in the local creative music community for workshop, rehearsal and performance space. The organization has gone on to provide a focus for the creation of an original West Coast Canadian musical idiom.

Some achievements over the years include the organization of three creative music festivals in 1979, 1980 and 1981, various album releases by local musicians including "Blue Tales in Time" by Paul Cram and the N.O.W. Band which was nominated for a Juno Award as Best Jazz Album of 1982, performances at various jazz festivals across Canada, including the du Maurier International Jazz Festival Vancouver, and so on.

Marilyn Crispell

Pianist Marilyn Crispell has been described as a brilliant virtuoso, someone whose speed and clarity of touch astonishes listeners. Yet her technique is always at the service of her musical sensibility, the energy shaped by the requirements of the form. She is leading piano music into the 1990's.

A graduate of both the New England Conservatory and Karl Berger's Creative Music Studio, she has performed with Anthony Braxton, Oliver Lake, Roscoe Mitchell and Cecil Taylor during the 70's and 80's. Braxton says of Crispell that "...Cecil Taylor apart, she's the strongest planist I know of. She has the kind of facility that's really awesome."

Marilyn Crispell will perform a set of solo piano music and then will perform as featured guest with the 17 piece N.O.W. Orchestra playing original compositions.
