Bob Berg has gained a reputation as one of the hottest and most accomplished tenor saxophonists in jazz. Since 1969, he has performed with greats like Jack McDuff, Horace Silver, Cedar Walton, and Tom Harrell. In 1984, Bob joined the Miles Davis band and stayed for three years. His solo recording debut as Tom Flarrell. In 1704, pop joined the Miles Davis balla and slayed for times years. All the records I grew up loving—John Coltrane, Sonny Rollins, Stanley Turrentine, Cannonball Adderley, Charlie Parker—all feel good. That music always swings. That's my main thing." Saxophonist Ab Baars strikes a delicate balance between clarity and precision and adds an explosive raw emotionality. Working with rudimentary themes he evokes all kinds of atmospheres to create his own world of sound. Dutch trumpeter Thomas Heberer is an awardwinning composer and has played with Albert Mangelsdorff, Muhal Richard Abrams, Willem Breuker, and David Murray. Like Wynton Marsalis, trumpeter Terence Blanchard leads one of the most dynamic bands on the contemporary mainstream scene. Little more than a decade ago, Blanchard went from playing in Lionel Hampton's big band to a four-year stint with Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers where he took over from Wynton Marsalis. Shortly thereafter he partnered with saxophonist Donald Harrison and together they recorded five albums for Concord Jazz and Columbia. Blanchard has also composed numerous soundtracks over the years including Spike Lee's 1992 film epic Malcolm X, a jazz score for the new Wesley Snipes' film Sugar Hill , Showtime's Assault at West Point: The Court Martial of Johnson Whittaker, and Spike Lee's brand new film Brooklyn. His latest recording, The Billie Holiday Songbook (Columbia), is a reverential tribute to Lady Day which

features vocals by a refreshingly creative new singer who just happens to be Dizzy Gillespie's daughter, Jeanie Bryson. Says Kenny Barron, "She has a great voice, husky, real dreamy, good intonation, and she knows how to phrase." This concert promises to be a festival highlight with Bruce Barth piano, Chris Thomas bass, Troy Davis drums, and Jeanie Bryson vocals.

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BONGO BOB

Graham Ord flute/piccolo/ saxophone leads Vancouver's finest Latin jazz musicians. Bongo Bob combines the freedom of improvisational music with grooving rhythms; a mélange of Brazilian and Afro-Cuban influences. Keita has been called "the golden Voice of Africa" and "one of the world's greatest soul singers." The fact that he comes from Mali in West Africa, where voices are treasured as instruments for carrying the history of the people, makes Salif's status exceptional. And his voice is outstanding by any standard; its high wailing tone and long mournful notes immediately identify him with the Islamic traditions of his home country. Salif's life story, too, is a triumph over seemingly rigid factors; being born albino and belonging to a noble family whose predetermined lifeplan did not include singing. In Mali, a singer's career is usually determined by one's birth into a family of griots. As a child, Salif would listen as griots visited his family, to sing praises and tell of local news and that triggered something in him. He told the British magazine Folk Roots, that bad evesiaht blocked him from

teacher-training and suggested to him a career as a singer. In order to fulfill that ambition, Salif had to leave his family and settle in Bamako, the capital of Mali. There he struggled to survive as a singer and musician until, in 1970, he joined the government-sponsored Rail band which played in the bar of Bamako Station. Today, Salif Keita, along with Youssou N'Dour, is established as one of Africa's leading international artists. His most recent releases on Mango Records, Ko-yan and Amen, are musically awe-inspiring and confirm Keita as an artist of world stature. Do not miss it!



FRANKIE LEE

One of the finest voices on the soul/blues scene, singer Frankie Lee grew up singing gospel music in his native Texas. Lee began recording in 1963 and worked with the likes of Albert Collins, Big Mama Thorton, Gatemouth Brown, and Bobbie Bland. He regularly tours Europe and Japan and has recently released a new CD, Goin' Back Home on Blind Pig Records. Backed up by Robert Lee Byrd and the Bay Area All-Stars.





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

Jay McShann is a living jazz legend. His soulful singing and compelling blues-based piano work—a synthesis of boogiewoogie and Basie— is representative of the Kansas City era of jazz. From the late 1930s McShann has led a variety of bands. His extraordinary big band of the early 1940s achieved international success with hits like Confessin' The Blues and Swingmatism. By the 1950s McShann began touring and recording with small ensembles. Since then he has performed at festivals and clubs all over the world. He was profiled by public television and starred, along with Count Basie and Joe Turner, in Bruce Ricker's movie, The Last of the Blue Devils. As Owen Cordle wrote in Down Beat when reviewing the Sackville recording, Saturday Night Function: "The successful evocation

Youssou N'Dour is one of the most admired singers in the world, an unforgettable and authentic voice from África. In 1986, Peter Gabriel introduced the Senegalese singer to North American audiences when he featured Youssou on the album So and invited him on a world tour. But Youssou had already been a star in Africa and Europe for years. 




