the first time are; the great Brazilian performer and songwriter, Gilberto Gil, the Pino Minafra Sud Ensemble, an amazing sextet that blends cutting edge jazz with a uniquely Italian sense of humour; the intense and hard hitting swing of Holland's Yuri Honing Trio; the dadaist sensibility of the Recedents and the uncanny interplay of John Law and Louis Moholo from Britain; the chamber sounds of the Canvas Trio (France, Portugal, Germany) and the hard core funk/jazz explorations of the Screaming Headless Torsos from NYC (on a double bill with Maceo Parker).

Watch for new projects involving Vancouver artists Paul Plimley, François Houle and the N.O.W. Orchestra with various visiting composers and improvisors. We've also arranged numerous tours; most notably with Christy Doran's ensemble, Ab Baars Trio, Don Byron's Music for Six and the Denis Colin Trio.

Being part of a national jazz festival scene, working with partners who are thousands of miles away—from Edmonton, through the prairies to Toronto, Montreal and Quebec City—is very special. Among the finest in the world, these events provide a musical window into the global jazz scene which should make all Canadians proud. Coastal Jazz and Blues Society is a leading player on the national and international scene and we are truly excited as we enter our second decade. Please help us celebrate the 11th!

GEORGE SHEARING

"Shearing's jazz virtuosity and classical experience...make magic."—Network The amazing George Shearing enjoys an international reputation as a pianist, arranger and composer. Equally at home on the classical concert stage as in jazz clubs, Shearing is recognized for inventive, orchestrated jazz. He has written over 300 compositions, including the classic Lullaby of Birdland, which has become a jazz standard. In 1949, two years after moving to the U.S. from England, he gathered a quintet to record September in the Rain for MGM. The record was an overnight success and sold 900,000 copies. Since then, Shearing has become one of the world's most popular recording artists. Stephane Grappelli, Carmen McRae, Hank Jones, Ray Brown and Mel Tormé are just a few of the many talented musicians he has performed with over the years. A two-time Grammy Award winner, pianist George Shearing appears with acclaimed bassist Neil Swainson for a special opening night performance to launch the jazz festival.



DIANA KRALL TRIO

Pianist/vocalist Diana Krall is one of the greatest jazz musicians to emerge from Canada during the last decade. Her huge impact on the New York jazz scene in recent years has positioned her on the international stage alongside fellow Canadian pianists Oscar Peterson and Oliver Jones, Quite simply, Diana is one of the finest young musicians in the world. She combines the vocal stylings of Shirley Horn and Carmen McRae with the piano influences of Oscar Peterson and her mentor Jimmy Rowles. The result is pure ecstacy. Just listen to her reading of Straighten Up and Fly Right from her first CD, Steppin' Out, or Squeeze Me from her second CD Only Trust Your Heart. Her third album All For You, is a magnificent tribute to Nat King Cole. Few young vocalists can match her maturity, sense of phrasing and sheer musicianship. Whether a song focuses on the vocal or calls upon her piano skills, Krall always plays and sings with lots of heart and soul. Her outstanding jazz festival appearance here last year was sold out. Guitarist and singer Richard Hefoume Amouzou's band is a hot cookin' pot of funky Afro-Cuban, Highlife and jazz influences. This marvellous group brings together three of the most exciting instrumentalists on the planet. Ray Anderson has all but revolutionized the art of *trombone* playing. Equal parts experimentalist, vaudevillian and virtuoso, he plays faster and with more variations of tone and timbre than his contemporaries. Be it a basic blues, an intricate original or a straightahead blowing tune, Ray injects extraordinary energy and feeling into his music. On the evidence of his many fine albums for Gramavision and other labels, he's also a helluva composer providing lyrical swingers, laid back waltzes and highly complex pieces. And he does all this with a bristling sense of humour. Ray has played with Anthony Braxton's quartet as well as leading many of his own bands, big and small. Marcus Rojas has been hailed as a *tuba* genius by everyone from record producer Hal Willner to Whitney Balliett of *The New Yorker. The Boston*

Phoenix recently remarked, "...Rojas is a blend of Motown bassist James Jameson and a teenage mutant ninja turtle. With barely a pause, Rojas pumped enough air into that big brass behemoth to keep it percolating throughout two sets and, like the late Motown legend, never let a syncopated beat keep him from building a melodic part as well. This was tuba you could love solo." Rojas has performed with his own groups as well as the Metropolitan Opera, Charlie Haden, Lester Bowie, Lionel Hampton and others. Pheeroan akLaff's intensely dynamic use of the drum kit has been featured on recent recordings by Mal Waldron, Geri Allen and Anthony Braxton. His unique treatment of rhythm has also expanded the structured works of Henry Threadgill as well as the improvisational works of Cecil Taylor.

This young and exciting Toronto band is taking the nation by storm. The release of their first record. First Impressions for the Bottom Jiaglers (SoulShack), and their hit single Funkmobile, have led many across the country to embrace the group's groove-oriented sound. 
BeausoLeil avec Michael Doucet

"The most versatile, most innovative Cajun band around, BeauSoleil manages with each album to both strengthen the music's roots and lengthen its branches."—L.A. Times Nominated for five Grammys, the Louisiana-based BeauSoleil is hailed by critics, fellow musicians, and fans worldwide as America's premier Cajun band. With fiddles and Acadian accordions up front with the singers, this music is festive and irresistably danceable. Cajun music originated in the bayou deltas of southeastern Louisiana among descendants of 17th century French refugees from Nova Scotia. The members of BeauSoleil have long been respected as masters of the tradition but they're also recognized as experimenters who blend in more contemporary influences. The group stirs up a rich, varied musical sauce piquante that mixes

Cajun and Zydeco music with blues, country, Tex-Mex, Caribbean and every other style that has made its way down the Mississippi. Leader/fiddler Michael Doucet is no purist; his virtuosic flights include non-Cajun references and he lets the songs sizzle. We invite you to party with an ensemble the Rolling Stone calls "the best damn dance band you'll ever hear." Don't delay, last year's concert sold out quickly. With David Doucet guitar/vocals, Jimmy Breaux Acadian accordion, Al Tharp bass/banjo/fiddle, Billy Ware percussion and Tommy Alesi drums.

Look out! Here they come! Javon Jackson, Tim Hagans, Greg Osby, Kevin Hays and Bill Stewart—five of the most talented young musicians on the current jazz scene in one terrific all-star grouping. But this is not a manufactured jazz supergroup. The idea for the band took shape when New York television station WNET enlisted their services (at the behest of Blue Note Records) for a taped performance at Sweet Basil. The band members discovered such a strong chemistry that they decided to further expand their working relationship. All five had recently recorded albums for Blue Note, but impressed label executives offered to support the fledgling ensemble, by scoring it a few club gigs and



arranging studio time. *Trumpeter* Tim Hagans is, at 41, the elder of the group. With early gigs with Stan Kenton and Woody Herman's bands to his credit, Hagans went on to perform with big bands led by Bob Mintzer, Maria Schneider and Gil Evans as well as dates with Gary Peacock, the Yellowjackets and Joe Lovano. At 27, pianist Kevin Hays has worked with the Harper Brothers, Joshua Redman, Benny Golson, Roy Haynes and Joe Henderson. Thirty year-old tenor saxophonist Javon Jackson has been heralded by Vogue as being one pillar of the young tenor triumvirate (along with Joshua Redman and James Carter). He has worked with Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers, Elvin Jones, Benny Green and Ron Carter. Alto saxophonist Greg Osby has worked with a range of jazz leaders, from John Faddis to Lester Bowie. A co-founder with Steve Coleman of the M-BASE collective, Osby has been one of jazz's free-thinking rebels since the late '80s. Twenty-eight year-old drummer Bill Stewart recently made his Blue Note debut with Snide Remarks, an album of hard-driving and angular tunes written and arranged by the leader. In the last few years Bill has gigged with Maceo Parker, Lee Konitz, Joe Lovano and John Scofield. Abbey Lincoln

June 24 Vogue Theatre Abbey Lincoln is one of the most original jazz vocalists of all time, Like Billie Holiday, whom she greatly admires, she uses her voice to convey emotion and intelligence with a personal delivery rooted in her own poetic lyrics. As did her idols, Ella Fitzgerald and Sarah Vaughan,



she began singing in local supper clubs. But before too long she was balancing a singing career with acting jobs. In 1956, she landed a role in the movie The Girl Can't Help It alongside Jayne Mansfield. Later she appeared in Nothing But a Man and For Love of Ivy with Sidney Poitier and most recently in Spike Lee's Mo'Better Blues. Soon after her brush with film stardom, Abbey began working with Max Roach, whom she later married. One of their most powerful collaborations was the album Freedom Now Suite. She also worked with Sonny Rollins, Wynton Kelly and Benny Golson among others. Throughout the '70s and '80s, Lincoln continued to record and work in the theatre. Since her debut recording, The World is Falling Down (Verve), her singing career has skyrocketed. She has released albums with Stan Getz, Hank Jones, Jackie McLean and Charlie Haden. 

"The Master Musicians' music is one of the great legal highs, a thundering, transporting chorale of undulating drones and shrill, ecstatic fanfares performed on an oboelike horn called the *ghaita* and underscored with mesmeric circular rhythms."—Rolling Stone "The music is an evocation of sustained ecstasy...And it is utterly intoxicating."—Newsweek The Master Musicians of Jajouka, an aristocratic tribe of royal pipers hidden in the mountains of North Africa, have lived peacefully for centuries, playing their entrancing music for the sultans of Morocco and keeping secret Arcadian rituals alive in their remote village. big band recording Tanjah won him Grammy nominations for best jazz performance. A prolific composer, Weston compositions are highly individualistic yet filled with melody and rhythmic flair. Hi-Fly, Little Niles and other Weston classics continue to be recorded by the top artists of the day. Alex Blake bass, Neil Clarke African percussion, Talib Kibwe alto sax/flute, Bill Saxton tenor sax and Benny Powell trombone.



June 25 Vogue Theatre Phil Woods is one of the finest alto saxophonists to have ever picked up the instrument. Influenced early on by Charlie Parker, Johnny Hodges and Benny Carter, he quickly developed his own signature sound. Brandishing a full tone, a deep vocabulary and a broad sense of phrasing, Woods is a thoroughly exciting player who frequently swings hard and inventively. His considerable skills as a composer can be heard on numerous tunes including Rights of Swing and I Remember: a group of remembrances of great jazz musicians. He has consistently topped the polls while winning four Grammy Awards. Musicians and singers with whom he's worked read like a who's who of jazz: Benny Goodman, Clark Terry, Bill Evans, Quincy Jones, Thelonious Monk, Dizzy Gillespie, Tommy Flanagan and Carol Sloane are just a few of those luminaries. In 1973. Woods formed The Phil Woods Quartet (now Quintet). Two of the original members, Steve Gilmore bass and Bill Goodwin drums are still with him more than 20 years later. Rounding out the group are Brian Lynch trumpet and Bill Charlap piano. They're gonna knock your socks off!




