

Tours and records with John Abercrombie Trio and Bass Desires. Erskine's two recent recordings. "Transition" and "Motion Poet", highly acclaimed. Latter named Best Recording 1988 by Japan's Ad Lib magazine. Erskine's 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' score won L.A. Drama Critics Best Original Score 1989 award.

RANDY BRECKER—Gained prominence as co-leader of the Brecker Bros. with Michael. Played with Horace Silver and Art Blakey, Currently co-leads a group with wife, Brazilian pianist, Eliane Alias. A versatile and strong trumpeter, much in demand both as a studio musician and sideman. Recent album with Joe Henderson received highly favorable reviews.

JOHN ABERCROMBIE—Early jazz-fusion guitarist, at home with electronics or straight electric. Initially with Billy Cobham. Nine albums as leader and 30+ with leaders like John Scofield, Jack DeJohnette, Dave Holland, Dave Liebman & McCov Tyner, In straight jazz duet with George Mraz, ethno-folk with Ralph Towner. quitar-synth in own trio, and ensemble with Erskine.

MARC JOHNSON—Started out with Woody Herman, with Bill Evans from 1978 until his death in 1980, worked with the Mel Lewis band, for a time with Stan Getz, and then with Philly Joe Jones, Bob Brookmeyer, John Lewis, Jim Hall and others. Interest in guitarists led to formation of the highly-regarded group Bass Desires with Erskine. John Scofield and Bill Frisell.

BOB MINTZER, JOE LOVANO and MARC COHEN-Three much indemand players on the New York studio and club scene. Tenorist MINTZER leads his own 13-piece band which has Brecker on trumpet, and two albums to its credit. Tenorist LOVANO plays lead with the Mel Lewis band. Both "hot" players and performed on Erskine's 4-star 'Transition' album. MARC COHEN plays keyboard/synth.



JANE BUNNETT QUINTET

ANE BUNNETT, a Toronto native, began her musical life as a classically trained pianist. Inspired by the music of Charlie Mingus, BUNNETT turned to jazz, first developing skills on the flute then later the soprano saxophone. With her own group she has also established herself as a composer and arranger. Her recent debut album "In Dew Time", with guest artists Don Pullen. and Dewey Redman, was nominated for a JUNO and has received favorable reviews.

The Quintet includes LARRY CRAMER on trumpet, JEAN BEAUDET on piano, NORMAN GUILBEAULT on bass and MICHEL RATTE on drums. The latter three were also nominated for a JUNO this year, as part of the Jean Beaudet Quartet. Obviously strong support for a prolific BUNNETT who is gaining increased recognition as a talented jazz player.

THE PAUL PERRY ORCHESTRA REUNION


AUL GULOIEN, known professionally as PAUL PERRY, had a significant impact on jazz in Canada. His jazz-influenced dance bands, which played Saskatchewan and Alberta during the 40's to early 60's, were literally training grounds for many top Canadian jazz players.

The evening 'recreates' the sounds which provided so many hours of listening and dancing pleasure, and 'celebrates' the man and his music with former sidemen, family and friends.

Born in Wadena, PAUL GULOIEN and brothers, Edward, Howard and Jim, all pursued careers as dance-band saxophonists, and sister Hazel Ann a concert singer. The PERRY ORCHESTRA got its big start in Saskatoon, played Kenosee Lake, Regina's Trianon Ballroom and many other dance spots of the day, but it was the summers at Varsity Hall, Sylvan Lake, Alberta, where much of their success was realized.

Musicians who worked for PERRY during the seventeen years at Sylvan Lake, form a "who's who" of western Canadian jazzmen, including—Chuck Barber, Chris Gage, Peter Dykesman, George Ursan, Dale Hillary, Don (D.T.) Thompson—to name but a few, in addition to the ORCHESTRA REUNION MEMBERS:

P.J. PERRY QUARTET

J. PERRY is recognized by critics, colleagues and listeners as one of North America's premier jazz saxophonists. While living in Vancouver, Toronto, New York and Edmonton, he shared the bandstand with countless jazz greats such as Dizzy Gillespie, Woody Shaw, Red Rodney, Pepper Adams, The Boss Brass, Maxine Sullivan, Jimmy Witherspoon, and more.

P.J. has performed with a number of Canada's symphonies and was featured soloist on the Michel LeGrand T.V. special with the Montreal Symphony Orchestra. Recording credits are diverse, from solo roles on the Edmonton Symphony's C.B.C. release "Paris" to two albums recorded at the Montreux Jazz Festival, one with Tommy Bank's Juno award winning big band, as well as his awn quintet album "Sessions".

Joining P.J. will be rhythm stalwarts and long-standing sidemen Edmonton's TED BOROWIECKI on piano and TORBAN OXBOL on bass, and Toronto's JERRY FULLER on drums.

THE PHIL WOODS QUINTET

Since 1975, PHIL WOODS has won Down Beat's Readers and International Critics Polls for alto saxophone each year but one. THE PHIL WOODS QUINTET has been voted DB's #1 Acoustic Jazz Group almost as consistently.

Three "Grammies", 1987 NAJE winners of combo and alto saxophone categories, 1985 Italian Critics awards for "best jazz group" and "best international record", and other awards all attest to WOOD's and his QUINTET's long-standing pre-eminence in the jazz world.

PHIL WOODS QUINTET

PHIL WOODS, the Massachusetts-born saxman and occasional clarinetist, matured during Charlie Parker's ascendancy and after stints with Quincy Jones, Benny Goodman, Dizzy Gillespie, and

other notable leaders, emerged as his own man, ready to start his own group. Formed in the mid-70's, two of the original members, bassist STEVE GILMORE and drummer BILL GOODWIN, are still in the band. Pianist HAL GALPER joined in 1981 and trumpeter TOM HARRELL in 1984.

THE PHIL WOODS QUINTET has an unerring devotion to the sound of "acoustic" music and minimizes the use of microphones in performance, preferring a natural unaltered blend of instruments. Stylistically, the members are also of one mind, preferring song form from the best music of Cole Porter to Tadd Dameron to Bill Evans.

HELEN MERRILL

Critic Rex Reed: "Helen Merrill is one of the distinctly individual singers of our time."

ELEN MERRILL is truly an international artist, having lived in the far east and Europe for several years. Entering the world of music with the emergence of combos, MERRILL's formative years were spent working with Earl Hines, Thad Jones, Clifford Brown, Stan Getz, Bill Evans, Charlie Byrd, and others.

MERRILL has made more than 30 albums in the U.S., Europe and Japan and was nominated for Grammies as "best jazz vocalist" in 1977 and 1980. Her latest albums have enjoyed the #1 chart position from France to Japan.

MIKE NOCK TRIO

ew Zealand pianist MIKE NOCK performs regularly on the U.S. and international jazz circuits and has appeared at most of the major jazz festivals, including several times at Edmonton's Jazz City. Played with Yusef Lateef, John Handy, Sonny Stitt, Freddie Hubbard, and others.

Canada's premier drummer TERRY CLARKE, now based in New York, and bassist MIKE LENT, featured at last year's Festival, round out the Trio for this WESTCAN JAZZ festivals' tour. The MIKE NOCK TRIO will open the Finale Concert and back singer HELEN MERRILL.

Each player has wide experience and is recognized throughout Canada as a leading jazz artist. Shier and Caird, members of award-winning VEJI, have both won awards as "Most Promising New Talent". Murphy has worked with many name

artists, composed extensively and worked as a music director for radio and TV. Kilburn and former Reginian Ursan are both indemand rhythm players who have performed and recorded with a wide variety of artists.

The Quintet appeared at the 1987 & 1988 Vancouver Jazz Festivals and most recently was featured on CBC's "Jazz sur le vif".

UNAR ADVENTURES, also a Vancouver group, includes COAT COOKE on tenor saxophone, RON SAMWORTH on electric guitar, CLYDE REED on bass and GREGG SIMPSON on drums. The players have worked together for a number of years

in a variety of groups and settings, including the New Orchestra Workshop collective of Canadian performer/composers. The music influences of the group ranges from jazz and harmolodic funk to celtic and calypso. The group is considered one

of the best exponents of this style and was nominated "Best Jazz Performers of the Year" West Coast Music Award by the Canadian Association of Recording Artists.

SATURDAY, JULY 1

AZFX (pronounced "jazz-effects") from Nova Scotia, represents the collaborative efforts of GENE SMITH on trombone/euphonium, ANDREW WEINZLER on woodwinds, BRUCE DUDLEY on keyboards, TERRY O'MAHONEY on drums, SKIP BECKWITH on bass and JOHN MCLEAN on guitar. The



group is molded in the tradition of such greats as Blakey/Miles/Silver but performs mostly original material with the roots of the music still evident. Formed in 1986, the group recently released an album (with liner notes

by Pat LaBarbara), and has been heard on CBC's national program "Jazz Beat". The musicians are on the jazz faculty of St. Francis Xavier University (Antigonish, Nova Scotia), but are working musicians and jazz players as well.

RAEME KIRKLAND and the WOLVES is a Toronto group led by drummer GRAEME KIRKLAND with PERRY WHITE on saxophone, SCOTT ALEXANDER on bass and GEOFF YOUNG on guitar. Kirkland has received much notice and praise for his playing, compositions and groups, and in particular from

established jazz players, such as Moe Koffman and Dave Holland, among others. His sidemen are equally talented and exciting players who perform in a variety of other groups and situations. The music ranges from the melodic to the





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
