ilton Nascimento brings forth a Baudelairean vision, an insight into beauty, and with it, a vague metaphysical sense and feeling. His mournful wailings come from deep within the mysteries of the church and grottoes at sundown. He sings of the pains of his ancestors. The music speaks of his motherland's dreams; Brazilian feasts and folklore, its people and their hearts." - Artur de Tavola, O Globo

Milton Nascimento is one of the most remarkable artists in the world. In his music there are influences from every continent and many eras: the Beatles, jazz, bossa nova, Gregorian chants, Andean flutes, Latin American nueva cancion, Portuguese fado, Minas Gerais folk tunes, African rhythms, Villa Lobos - all fused into a wholly singular style.

During a career that has spanned more than 20 years, Nascimento's deeply moving music and rich, astonishing voice have captivated audiences from Rio de Janeiro to Tokyo to Paris to Buenos Aires to New York. Among his fans are jazz luminaries Herbie Hancock, Pat Metheny, Wayne Shorter and George Duke, all of whom have collaborated with the Brazilian singer/songwriter.

Sarah Vaughan covered three Nascimento tunes on her 1987 *Brazilian Romance* LP and the Manhattan Transfer recorded "Viola Violar" on their Grammy Award-winning *Brasil* album. David Byrne chose two Nascimento songs ("San Vincente" and "Anima") for his hit Brazilian sampler *Brazilian Classics I: Beliza Tropical*.

Nascimento's acclaimed '88 Columbia debut album *Yauarete* included Herbie Hancock, Wayne Shorter, Paul Simon and Quincy Jones as guests and introduced the Brazilian star to a mainstream North American audience for the first time. Also in '88, Milton kicked off the first episode of David Sanborn's NBC "Night Music" show with a moving performance and appeared on Showtime cable channel's "Coast to Coast" hosted by Herbie Hancock.

Over the years, Nascimento has become Brazil's most popular musician and a major international star. He's also become something of a political leader, singing

Thurman Barker/ Joseph Jarman

Two's Company

Two major figures of the jazz avant garde meet for an evening of extraordinary music.

Self described "house drummer for the new music", Thurman Barker has worked with many of the biggest names in creative music including Sam Rivers, Cecil Taylor and Anthony Braxton. Multi-instrumentalist Joseph Jarman is best known as a member of the Art Ensemble of Chicago. He is one of the most fiercely creative players in the world today.

Drummer/percussionist
Thurman Barker became
interested in the drums in high
school. His parents sent him to
study twice a week at the
American Conservatory of Music,
where he worked on snare drum
and music theory, then graduated
to the drum kit. Early influences
were records he listened to by
Cozy Cole ("Topsy"), the
Cannonball Adderley Sextet and
Oscar Peterson with Louie
Bellson.

His association with Chicago's AACM (Association for the Advancement of Creative Musicians) began in '64 when he was still in high school. A school mate (the son of AACM founder Muhal Richard Abrams) told Barker of an experimental group that his father rehearsed every Monday night. His first rehearsal with them introduced him to Abrams, Joseph Jarman, Braxton, Lester Bowie, Roscoe Mitchell and Henry Threadgill.

At first confused by Muhal's instructions to "just play what you hear but don't give me any time or beat", Barker began investigating the music of drummers Tony Williams and Elvin Jones. He could hear freedom within form in their music. Combined with his



classical studies,

Barker developed a concept of controlled freedom, freedom with discipline, that has made him one of the most in demand players in creative music for a quarter of a century.

Born in Little Rock, Arkansas in 1937, Joseph Jarman was raised in Chicago. Returning home in 1965 after military service, Jarman was drawn to the music of the AACM. There he met Roscoe Mitchell, Famoudou Don Moye, Malachi Favors and Lester Bowie. Together they formed the Art Ensemble of Chicago, a radical band of saxophones, flutes, clarinets, trumpet, bass and percussion that mixed elements of music and political theatre into a unique chemistry of collective improvisation, individual expression and group discipline.

Jarman has recorded over 50 albums with the Art Ensemble, but maintains that "music is a language that can be spoken many ways", a philosophy which has led him into many and varied creative situations. He collaborates regularly with dancers and visual artists, and incorporates these elements fearlessly into his own solo performances.

Beyond his finesse with woodwind instruments, Jarman plays a variety of percussion instruments including vibes, marimba and balophone, as well as an array of bells, gongs and "little instruments".

Bobby Watson and Horizon

Expanding Horizons

The multi-talented **Bobby Watson** is one of the most important young alto saxophonists to emerge in the 1980s. His contributions to one of Art Blakey's youngest Jazz Messengers line-ups have brought him international acclaim.

Born in Lawrence, Kansas in 1953, Watson first studied piano and clarinet before taking up the tenor and alto saxophones in high school. After studying at the University of Miami, Watson graduated with a degree in music composition.

Arriving in New York in '76, one of his first gigs was with guitarist Roland Prince and drummer Billy Higgins. Watson's fiery alto soon caught the attention of drummer Art Blakey and, in 1978, he began a four and a half year stay as a Jazz Messenger.

After leaving Blakey, Watson formed a band with pianist Mulgrew Miller, bassist Curtis Lundy and drummer Kenny Washington and recorded *Beatitudes*, their first album together, in 1983. The quartet was expanded to a sextet with vibist Steve Nelson and percussionist Dom Um Romao for the subsequent album *Jewel*.

Watson's astonishing adaptability has been heard with many other ensembles, large and small. These cover an extraordinarily broad spectrum including Charlie Persip's Superband, the adventurous and improvisational 29th Street Saxophone Quartet, George Coleman's hard-bop group, Sam River's Winds of Manhattan, and even Panama Francis and the Savoy Sultans.



Bobby Watson: Soaring alto sax ... echoes of Bird, Johnny Hodges and Cannonball.


In 1988, Watson signed with the highly touted Blue Note record label. His debut recording, *No Question About It*, showcased his talents to a much wider audience. In fact, Watson has now established a unique voice with his raw emotional power, bebop virtuosity, melodic grace and rhythmic grit. Watson's searing signature sound - with it's echoes of Bird, Hodges and Cannonball - is likewise singular.

For his Vancouver debut, Watson is joined by Victor Lewis drums, Edward Simon piano, Carroll Dashiell bass and Melton Mustafa trumpet.

Blazing, guitar-powered blues! Lean and ferocious music ... an American music legend. A recording artist for almost 30 years, guitarist **Johnny Winter** burst from the Texas bar scene in the late '60s to become an

archetypal guitar hero. Johnny became a professional musician at age 14, when he and his keyboardwizard brother Edgar formed Johnny and the Jammers in their home town of Beaumont, Texas. They were a phenomenon, winning talent shows and eventually a recording contract. Their first single, "Schoolday Blues", was released when Johnny was just 15! In 1968, Rolling Stone magazine made him an overnight celebrity with a cover story. Winter signed with Columbia Records and released a series of classic blues LPs. His latest record, Winter of '88 (MCA), is contemporary blues firmly rooted in tradition. Winter has stuck to his guns and never stopped rocking.

Miltons is Nascimento's current recording for CBS. It's a great musical testament from the man Pat Metheny calls "... my musical idol ... he is the greatest; he is above criticism, fantastic ... it's impossible to measure the emotion."
