

STATE OF THE ART

Coastal Jazz and Blues Society has continued its strong commitment to year-round programming which has established a viable climate for creative music in Vancouver.

A local context has been provided for the du Maurier Ltd. International Jazz Festival Vancouver which has achieved international recognition for first-rate production and innovative programming. After the 1991 event, *Down Beat's* Kevin Whitehead wrote, "by a lot of standards, this is the best jazz festival in North America." Bearing this in mind, we do not intend to rest on past laurels nor do we wish to create a museum piece with which to preserve the musical past.

The shared principles and conventions of jazz are constantly being challenged by the shifting intellectual curiosity of artists throughout the world. Tradition doesn't flow in only one direction, it is fed by many tributaries. By the commercial definition of "popular music" much of the world's creative music is decidedly "unpopular". This in no way negates the music's potential to challenge and spiritually uplift large numbers of people.

This festival is dedicated to the creation of an informed audience, and to a recognition of the central role of the artist in society. We celebrate the honest expression of the human spirit.

As sculptor Henry Moore once wrote, "I am not interested in the expression of beauty, but in the power of expression."







JOHN ABERCROMBIE TRIO June 26 VECC

Guitarist John Abercrombie stands poised at the cutting edge of today's most creative and substantial improvised music. Along with Bill Frisell and John Scofield, he is one the most influential guitarists on the contemporary scene. A graduate of Boston's Berklee College of Music, Abercrombie moved to New York in 1969 and hooked up with Billy Cobham's band. In the early '70s he was a trail-blazer in the jazz-rock fusion world with the Brecker Brothers, Jeremy Steig and others. His first album as a leader was 1974's Timeless (ECM) with Jan Hammer and Jack DeJohnette. The classic "organ trio" setting of Timeless placed Abercrombie firmly in the ranks of guitar greats like Wes Montgomery, Grant Green, and Kenny Burrell. He followed soon after with Gateway, featuring DeJohnette and Dave Holland, and 1986's Current Events marked the beginning of his four-year association with drummer Peter Erskine and bassist Marc Johnson. He possesses a unique voice as a jazz guitarist, combining evolving technologies with a tradition well represented by jazz standards. TIM BERNE QUARTET June 27 VECC

"Berne's music is a fascinating amalgam of constantly changingup, off-kilter rhythms that sweep across classical and bop through soul, funk, no-wave and punk. It portrays a wry angst balanced by explosions of quirky humor, as fits this century's closing."- *Pulse. Saxophonist* Tim Berne has been playing his special brand of jazz for over 15 years; he has recorded for such respected labels as Soul Note and Columbia as well as his own Empire label. In 1988, Berne joined up with the German

JMT label and came out with Miniature's self-titled first recording (which featured Berne, Hank Roberts, and Joey Baron), as well as *Fractured Fairy Tales* by his own septet. Everything came together musically on the JMT releases: in the words of one critic, "here was the melding of the AACM (Association for the Advancement of Creative Musicians) jazz aesthetic with a Stax funk propulsion..." Berne's current JMT release is called *Pace Yourself*. Over the years he's performed with John Zorn, Bill Frisell, and Paul Motian among others. His crack band features *trumpet* whiz Herb Robertson, renowned *bassist* Mark Dresser, and the exhilarating Bobby Previte on *drums*.



Montreal bassist Lisle Ellis is a prominent member of the Canadian creative music community and has worked with Cecil Taylor, Jimmy Lyons, Tim Berne, and Vinny Golia among others. Critic Art Lange says about Ellis"...do not underestimate the importance of Ellis' encyclopedia of accents, attacks, sounds, and pitches in the loosening of structural shackles; a more conventional bassist would prove a ball-and-chain." Drummer John Heward from Montreal plays in the style of Sunny Murray and has worked with saxophonist Glenn Spearman, and clarinetist François Houle and others.



BOBBY BRADFORD MO'TET June 19 VECC

Bobby Bradford is a leading innovator in the world of improvised music. A cornetist of startling clarity and beauty, Bradford's warm, bluesdrenched sound has been a favourite of international fans and critics for over 35 years. Bobby first came to prominence in the seminal bands of Ornette Coleman from 1961-'63 where he was hailed for his pathfinding, yet always lyrical,

playing. Bradford cut his teeth in the competitive R&B music world with fellow Texans David Newman, Booker Ervin, and James Clay. After moving to L.A. he worked with the late great clarinetist John Carter, and also played with British drummer John Stevens and his Spontaneous Music Ensemble. Bradford is considered "a contemporary jazz master"

Voice. Just when you thought it was safe to put away your dancing shoes, a stunning musical and visual experience returns to Vancouver. "The Lion of Soweto", Mahlathini, combines his unearthly growl of a voice with The Mahotella Queens, South Africa's biggest-selling female vocal group, for an

unforgettable evening of sight and sound. Dressed in tribal beads and colourful costumes, Mahlathini and The Mahotella Queens celebrate the street-smart, joyous music they call "Mbaqanqa jive"—a combination of the raw and refined,

traditional African music and gospel-choir harmony. Backed by the Makgona Tsohle Band ("the band that knows everything"), the sound is both old and new. Electric guitars, pennywhistle, and drums create a modern dance beat while the singers extol the virtues of the tribal life that has been supplanted by the mean streets of Soweto and Johannesburg. The words are in Zulu, but the music and the dancing are so inspiring the message is unmistakable.



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MARGARETH MENEZES

"... Menezes displayed the explosive, wildly eclectic style that's begun to earn her the title Queen of World Music... Sounding at times like Aretha Franklin or Chaka Khan, moving around the tiny stage with the sheer physicality of Tina Turner, Menezes was a pyrotechnic ball of energy. Her voice, a rich, dark-hued instrument, shouted and popped on the up-tempo tunes, and purred with feral sensuality on the slower numbers." - Los Angeles Times. She's young, she's Brazilian and she's all the rage in her native land. Today, she's poised to take North America by storm. Bahian songstress Menezes, who began singing in church as a child, incorporates the gloriously polyrhythmic Afro-Bahian forms like lambada, afoxe, bloco Afro, and samba-reggae, all rarefied by a voice that can rouse an audience to its feet or seduce them down again with a soulful ballad. Her artistic scope is broad; she percolates over funk, pop and reggae, always with a generous helping of native Afro-Brazilian splendour. 



THE STAPLE SINGERS June 19 Queen Elizabeth Theatre



With a career that spans almost four decades, The Staple Singers have bridged the gap between gospel, soul, and pop. The unique, haunting sound of this family group made them a sensation with gospel audiences after they began recording in the mid '50s. Their fame spread to folk, rock and jazz audiences in the 1960s, and their sound influenced and inspired many of the biggest stars of that era, from Aretha Franklin to The Rolling Stones. In the early '70s, they became a leading force on the pop and soul music charts, earning Number 1 hits and gold records for such songs as *Respect Yourself* and *I'll Take You There*. In the mid '80s an affiliation with The Talking Heads brought their music to a whole new audience. Today the Staple Singers are still a legend but they are also a vital creative force who provide a thrilling musical experience.

The story of this remarkable group begins with Roebuck "Pops" Staples. With only his bluesy finger-style electric guitar accompaniment, the family created a unique and compelling group vocal sound. Even in her teens, his daughter Mavis Staples was blessed with the deep thrilling contralto which has been hailed as one of the great voices in modern music. While traditional gospel music was their starting point, the Staple Singers have always been innovators who crossed stylistic boundaries. The intense bluesy quality of their vocal harmonies and of Pops Staples' brilliant electric guitar playing set them apart. These days Pops and Mavis are pursuing solo careers, but they also continue to perform with the Staple Singers. Pops released his first solo album in 1987, and his second one has just come out. Mavis performed her 1991 R&B hit Melody Cool on the Arsenio Hall show last year and the rest of the Staple Singers joined her for a rendition of Respect Yourself. Mavis also toured Europe with Prince and appears in his 1990 film Graffiti Bridge. Expect a roof-raising opening night. John Hammond opens the show.

Stratochiefs

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




Born in Puerto Rico, Yomo Toro is keeping alive a Puerto Rican music called *jibaro* which is rich and raucous, with blindingly-

swift arpeggios, and wild flamenco strumming. Jibaro is rooted in 17th century Spanish ballads, Creole traditions, and African rhythms. Since settling in New York, Toro has performed and recorded with Latin greats like Celia Cruz, Ruben Blades, and Hector LaVoe and has been a featured player on more than 150 albums, including ten of his own. His most recent releases are Gracias and Funky Jibaro (Island). He made his film debut in Ruben Blades' Crossover Dreams in 1985 and is also a featured soloist on David Byrne's Rei Momo, Check out "the Jimi Hendrix of the cuatro" along with his eight-piece band (congas, bongos, timbales, flute, guiro, and voice) as they perform such Puerto Rican rhythms as the plena and bomba and dance forms like the mazurka, danza, valse, and guarachan jibara.
