earned her reputation as one of Canada's best vocalists. From singing to packed audiences in nightclubs across the country as a pop artist to seducing patrons at concert halls and theatres with her rich interpretations of jazz and blues standards, Johnson brings an emotional depth to songs that few singers ever attain. "She is a proud Canadian who looks for original songs, vehicles for adult emotions...it's the timbre of her voice that elevates them," says the Evening Standard of London (England), while the Toronto Star writes, "Flashes of Dinah Washington, Janis Joplin, and Billie Holiday colour the naturally warm textures of her voice. She's full of drama, wit, and heartache." Molly's latest release Messin' Around (Anthem/Universal) builds on the

strength of her first two CDs and sees her poised on the brink of widespread crossover success. The music is highly engaging, as Johnson skillfully integrates her well-honed melodic skills, artful Tin Pan Alley-style lyrics, jazz phrasing, and overall pop sensibility. What's most impressive is the breadth of influences that run through the album's twelve tunes—hints of bossa nova, French chanson, pop, funk, jazz, and tender ballads—all rendered with characteristic aplomb.

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

Slammin' The Infinite — Steve Swell trombone, Sabir Mateen reeds, Matt Heyner bass, and Klaus Kugel drums — is one of the most exciting working groups in jazz today. A New York-based quartet with three acclaimed CDs, their music sounds like a 21stcentury extension of the late '60s work of Roswell Rudd and Grachan Moncur III (New Africa). The All *Music Guide* describes it as "exuberant, celebratory, and sophisticated—free and at times breathtaking, without sacrificing melody or charm." Steve Swell, who has worked with a diversity of jazzers—from Lionel Hampton and Buddy Rich to Tim Berne and William Parker—leads the group. Of this awesome instrumentalist, *Jazz Now* writes, "Swell's powerful trombone zooms in and out of the music like a plane diving at a target. Players like him are to be thanked for the revival of interest in the instrument."



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DAVID OCCHIPINTI QUARTET

Toronto-born guitarist David Occhipinti has released four acclaimed CDs featuring his original compositions: David Occhipinti (1997), Syzygy (1999), Intersection (2003), and Forty Revolutions (2007). He has also issued two recordings (Duologue, Duologue Vol. 2) with saxophonist Mike Murley. A former student of guitar great Jim Hall, this velvet-toned electric guitarist has made an impact on the national jazz scene with his appealing combination of lyricism and cutting-edge sensibility. Occhipinti is also a gifted composer. Last year he wrote Four Pieces for String Quartet, which was performed by the Madawaska String Quartet, and Purple Sky, which was performed by the Arraymusic Ensemble. Occhipinti's all-star quartet features renowned Toronto-based musicians Kevin Turcotte trumpet, Andrew Downing bass, Terry Clarke drums.

"Amendola has complete mastery of every piece of his drum set and the ability to create a plethora of sounds using sticks, brushes, mallets, and even his hands."-Modern Drummer San Francisco-based drummer Scott Amendola is the lynchpin for some of the most exciting ensembles on the scene, including the Nels Cline Singers and his own band, which features the marvelous talents of violinist Jenny Scheinman, guitarist Jeff Parker (Tortoise), and bassist John Shifflett. He's also the working drummer for the wildly popular singer Madeleine Peyroux. Throw in his work with Charlie Hunter and T. J. Kirk as well as collaborations with Bill Frisell, John Zorn, Jackie Terrasson, Paul Plimley, Michael Franti, and others, and you've got a musician who likes to mix it up. On Believe (Cyrptogramophone), Amendola's band moves from hard-hitting grooves to lush ballads and from original material to covers by Jimi Hendrix, Fela Kuti, and Nick Drake.

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COMIN' OUT SWINGIN' SEXUALITIES AND IMPROVISATION SYMPOSIUM

Improvisation, Community, and Social Practice

NOVEMBER 16 & 17 St John's College Lounge, UBC

Improvised and creative new musics have been on the upswing in recent years, but listeners, critics, and scholars have said little, so far, about the relationships of the various forms and practices of improvisation to gender and sexuality. Compositions and performances in recent years by such prominent artists as Marilyn Lerner, Fred Hersch, Patricia Barber, Irene Schweizer, Maggie Nicols, Gary Burton, Pauline Oliveros, Lori Freedman, Steve Lacy and Irene Aebi, Miya Masaoka, Evan Parker, Peter Brötzmann, and many others have placed the cultural politics of gender directly at issue, while many recorded works from the history of improvised music and jazz (from Valaida Snow to Cecil Taylor, from Billy Strayhorn to Andy Bey) provoke a reconsideration of the music's relationship to sexuality and identity. A variety of papers, panel discussions, and artist talks will be presented. Speakers include Sherrie Tucker, Matana Roberts, and Marilyn Lerner. MARILYN LERNER : SOLO PIANO

Exhilarating jazz *pianist/ improviser* Marilyn Lerner's work spans the worlds of jazz, creative improvisation, klezmer, and twentieth-century classical music. She composes for film, theatre, radio, and television and is rapidly making a name for herself in forging her own unique bridge between jazz and klezmer music. Lerner's audio art collages have been broadcast on the CBC and around the world.

Matana Roberts is a dynamic saxophonist, composer, and *improviser* who tries to expose the mystical roots and spiritual traditions of African-American creative expression in her music. A Chicago native and member of the AACM (Association for the Advancement of Creative Musicians), Matana was surrounded by elder musicians who taught her the importance of listening to her own personal creative voice. Indeed, she has crafted a voice that not only speaks to her artistic and creative individuality but testifies, critiques, documents, and responds to the many socioeconomic, historical, and cultural inequalities that exist all over the world.

Matana has appeared as a




Lacy, Tito Puente, Michael Vatcher, and Gerry Hemingway.

Lerner's most recent recordings include the Queen Mab Trio's new release *Thin Air* (WIG); *Luminance* (Ambiances Magnétiques), a collection of solo improvised piano music using different microphone techniques; and a duo with jazz guitar legend Sonny Greenwich titled *Special Angel* (CBC records).

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TD CANADA TRUST HIGH SCHOOL JAZZ INTENSIVE, PRESENTED BY CANFOR **HEAR THE FUTURE OF JAZZ! Canada Trust**

Twenty students from the Lower Mainland and Canfor operating regions were chosen through a competitive audition process to participate in the 2007 edition of the TD Canada Trust High School Jazz Intensive, presented by Canfor. This nine-day residency program gives students a chance to learn from some of the best musicians in the world. Jazz visionary, creative instrumentalist, composer, and educator Nicole Mitchell returned this year as resident artist and conductor to lead the band.

Attending three-hour daily rehearsals, workshops, and nightly concerts shaped a very busy, but extremely rewarding residency for the students. On opening night, the students, along with artist Nicole Mitchell, program facilitator Bob Rebagliati, and Jazz Festival education coordinator Kristin Fung, met at the Listel Hotel for a fabulous dinner provided by O'Douls Restaurant and a field trip to see the legendary saxophonist Sonny Rollins. On Sunday, July 1 the band performed pieces by Charles Mingus, Nicole Mitchell, and charts by student composition contest winners Eli Bennett and Daniel Reynolds in Festival Hall at the Roundhouse Community Centre.

WINS THE GALAXIE RISING STARS AWARD AT THE TD CANADA TRUST VANCOUVER INTERNATIONAL JAZZ FESTIVAL

Galaxie, The Continuous Music Network of the CBC, in association with the TD Canada Trust Vancouver International Jazz Festival, is proud to announce the Amanda Tosoff Quartet as the winner of the fifth annual Galaxie Rising Stars Award. Chosen from artists competing for the Award as the new artist of the year, the winner will receive a \$2000 grant.

Twenty-three-year-old *pianist/ composer* **Amanda Tosoff** is one of the most compelling young voices in the Vancouver jazz scene. A recent graduate of the Capilano College Jazz Studies Program, she has already performed with such jazz luminaries as Ed Thigpen, Regina Carter, Seamus Blake, Jane Bunnett, and Kate Hammett-Vaughan. Her stellar quartet features some of the most talented young players in Vancouver: Evan Arntzen saxophones, Sean Cronin bass, and **Morgan Childs** *drums*. This exciting group plays

a mix of standards and originals, with Amanda's highly swinging approach to the piano reflecting the sound of such greats as Oscar Peterson, Renee Rosnes, and Bill Evans. A debut CD called Still Life (Cellar Live) has received rave reviews.

The 22nd annual TD Canada Trust Vancouver International Jazz Festival has just completed one of its most successful seasons to date. With over 1800 musicians from around the world performing at over 40 indoor and outdoor venues throughout the city, the Festival once again drew in excess of 500,000 people, confirming its status as Vancouver's biggest music and arts event. Musicians and audiences alike herald the Festival as one of the best cultural celebrations in the world. The Galaxie Rising Stars Program of the CBC is a proud supporter of Canadian music. To date, over 550 artists and groups have benefited from the Galaxie Rising Stars Program. Heavyweight saxophonist/composer/ arranger and Qualicum Beach, B.C. native Phil Dwyer is a Canadian jazz giant. A skilled improviser par excellence, he has performed with a list of global luminaries that includes Kenny Barron, Renee Rosnes, Aretha Franklin, Ian Tyson, Gino Vannelli, Tom Harrell, Dave Holland, and Kenny Wheeler. Dwyer first came to prominence with the Juno Award-winning Hugh Fraser Quintet during the mid-80s. In 1989 he moved to Toronto, where he worked with Don Thompson, Moe Koffman, and others. He has won several Juno Awards, including one with Dave Young for Fables and Dreams and another with flugelhornist Guido Basso for Lost in the Stars. In the saxophone trio format, Phil has released a stellar recording called Let Me Tell You About My Day (Alma) with bassist Rodney Whitaker and drummer Alan Jones. For this occasion, Vancouver stalwarts André Lachance bass and Bernie Arai drums will join Dwyer.



The quartet recently issued a CD called *Live at The Montreal Bistro* (Fishhorn Records). The music is a mix of standards arranged by band members or rewritten to create new tunes on familiar structures as well as original material. The musical styles highlight



Amsterdam-based pianist Achim Kaufmann creates unique ways of balancing composition and improvisation. He currently leads an improvising trio that includes Frank Gratkowski and Wilbert de Joode. He has also worked with Michael Moore, John Hollenbeck, Tomasz Stanko, and Dylan van der Schyff. Among his many CDs is a fantastic solo piano record called knives (Leo). German *multi-reeds* player **Frank** Gratkowski is a vital member of the world's improvising community, having performed with an array of artists that

includes Ken Vandermark, Kenny Wheeler, Louis Sclavis, and Phil Minton. He also leads a stellar quartet with Dieter Manderscheid, Wolter Wierbos, and Gerry Hemingway. Wilbert de Joode is one of the most active bass players on the Dutch improvised music scene. He is active in groups led by Ab Baars, Ig Henneman, Eric

Boeren, and Michiel Braam.


Renowned German bassist Torsten Müller has become a valued collaborator in our vibrant creative music scene since making Vancouver his home some seven years ago. 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
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
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
